We are "The People of the Book" because of our intimate connection to the Hebrew Bible and the tens of thousands of commentary, codes and Jewish literature we published throughout history.



People of the Book

The Codex Sassoon is the oldest nearly complete version of the Hebrew Bible in existence. It was recently purchased for \$38 million (U.S.) on behalf of the American Friends of ANU and donated to the Museum of the Jewish People in Tel Aviv. It is thought to have been created between 880 and 960 c.e. and is missing just six pages. This is The Book of The People of the Book! I hope that it will be on display in June when I visit the Museum on my nephew's bar mitzvah Israel trip.

Jews love books. So important is reading to us that when the printing press was invented in 1492, we were among the first to use it for the printing of the Bible, *Talmud* and commentators. Harry Wolfson, a Harvard historian, made this point abundantly clear. According to the *Jerusalem* Post, "He was once confronted by a colleague who said, 'Why do you Jews think you are so special?' Wolfson is reputed to have responded: 'As far as I know, we are the only people who, when we drop a book on the floor, we pick it up and kiss it."

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Reading books, according to experts, increases your vocabulary and comprehension skills, reduces stress, helps you prepare to sleep, can prevent cognitive decline and might even help you live longer.

About ten years ago, I was employed by Toronto Pearson Airport, just one of approximately 28,000 staff who called the airport their place of work. Back then, if anyone had a problem with parking services, the taxis and limos or the folks who ticketed you if you idled too long at the entry doors, I was "the guy" to call ... and did I ever get a lot of calls! And that was just the front-ofhouse. The rest of the facility was always bustling and I recall thinking the airport was like a city within a city.

That's when the shul really comes to life, and it doesn't stop until we close at 11:00 PM—or after when we host *smahot* receptions. Tots programs, volunteer committee meetings, lecture series, *b'nei mitzvah* lessons, evening minyanim, basketball in the Kimel Family Gym, special dinners, big and small programs, aufrufs, weddings, baby namings and *britot* ... it's always hopping! That's exactly how we love it ... and why Beth Tzedec really is a city within a city.

There is so much happening and as I

always write, we encourage our members to be a part of the action by finding your 'wheelhouse' and using it as a comfortable entry point into the shul.

A good portion of our members come to pray, celebrate, mourn and reflect. But if you are one of those who join us just for the High Holy Days and perhaps a few other times each year, finding another way to feel part of your shul is easier than you think. For example:



Dear Friends,

In the springtime, I had planned to spend one week in Poland, and the following week in Israel. Everything was set both at the shul and at home. Members of the Spiritual Leadership Team were covering classes and minyan responsibilities. Since it was the beginning of the *omer*, there was no *smahot*. My husband, God bless him, had a plan for our daughter. As a result, I left for the March of the Living prepared to be away for two weeks, including two Shabbatot.

What I was not prepared for, mentally or literally, was a third and a fourth week out of the office, corresponding to two more Shabbatot away from our Beth Tzedec community. Merely 36 hours after returning home from Israel, I was in the E.R., which led to a weeklong stay at North York General Hospital. According to the doctor on 8 West, "bad luck" was the cause for my severe kidney infection. I will spare you the details and the symptoms. But keep in mind that when I asked a nurse friend of mine, "Who stays in a hospital this long?" her answer was, "Sick people."

When I was sick in that first week of May, I was uncomfortable, I was in pain and I was miserable. And, for the first time that I can remember, I was the recipient of *bikkur holim*, the mitzvah of visiting or caring for the sick, instead of the professional or personal mitzvah doer. When we had COVID, people couldn't visit.

During the week that I was home recuperating, as I was trying to comprehend the amount of *hesed* and love that were showered on me and my family, I reviewed the *halahot* of *bikkur holim*.

The *halakhah* that jumped out at me over and over again is from tractate *Nedarim*. Aha bar Hanina said: Anyone who visits an ill person takes from him one-sixtieth of his suffering. I knew that text, I knew that law, but I never experienced it as the recipient before.

Nearly 50 different people from our Beth Tzedec community either came to the hospital or my home to visit me while I was sick. My husband Aaron and my daughter Ariella came to the hospital every single day. They were literally living our values of care and connect. More than that, I actually felt

a smidge better after each visit. My focus could be on other people and their families instead of my own situation.

I also appreciated that unless we were extremely close, most waited a few days to come see me. That corresponded with the story of Abraham and his *brit milah* from *Genesis* 18, when he was sitting at the entrance of the tent as the day grew hot.

Rabbi Ḥanina in Bava Metzia wrote that visitors came to see Abraham three days after his procedure. Later, we find in the Shulḥan Arukh: It is a religious duty to visit the sick. Relatives and friends may enter at once and strangers after three days. My life was mirroring this.

It was eye-opening for me to see how generously our community engages in *hesed* and specifically *bikkur holim*. One of our members set up a meal train and we did not need to make dinner for two weeks. People brought me an array of magazines. Representatives from the Family Engagement Committee brought a soft blanket to the hospital so I would be more comfortable while I was stuck in there. People sent me flowers which really and truly brightened my day. Equal to all of that was that nobody said, "Get back to work." Instead, people said, "Take care of yourself so you can come back as you were before."

A month is a long time for a congregational rabbi not to enter their shul. It was hard for me to let go, especially in the first few days, when I was in the worst pain and the most discomfort. But the gratitude that I have for our community, specifically during this temporary episode in my life, will never be forgotten.

No Pain, No Gain

"For many of us who are in town during the summer to attend services for Tisha B'Av, besides hearing the chanting of the Book of Lamentations (*Eikhah*), the most well-known and poignant component is the singing of the acrostic elegy Eli Tziyon. This *kinah*, or dirge, written in the Middle Ages but of anonymous authorship, consists of 12 stanzas, each closing with the initial refrain: "Wail, Zion and its cities, as a woman in labour pains, and like a maiden girded in sackcloth to mourn for the husband of her youth."

Though there are several theories as to the origin and migration of the melody, it seems probable that it represents a particular instance of a widespread European "migrant" tune or melodic pattern. Jewish music professor Eric Werner points out that the Festival of St. James in the 9th century often coincided with the three weeks leading up to Tisha B'Av, so when people were making a pilgrimage to the shrine of St. James in Santiago de Compostela in northwestern Spain, this is the melody they likely found at that period. It is probable that it became associated at that time with Tisha B'Av.

The earliest notated evidence of the melody found so far is in the manuscript manual of Judah Elias of

Hanover (1743), for L'kha Dodi (in a slightly varied form), and in several of the manuals of 18th-century cantors. Its earliest appearance in print is in Isaac Nathan's setting of "O weep for those that wept by Babel's stream" in Byron's Hebrew Melodies (1815). The melody is of an elegiac character and has become, for all Ashkenazi communities, a symbol of the yearly commemoration of the Destruction. It is often used for L'kha Dodi during the "three weeks" from the 17th of Tammuz to the 9th of Av, especially on the Friday night preceding Tisha B'Av. The dirge enumerates, in detail, the cruelties suffered by Judea and its inhabitants during the destruction of the Second Temple, all that we materially and spiritually lost.

Yet, despite the tragic loss, the above opening line of the *kinah* provides a ray of hope. Israel's suffering is not in vain, rather the destruction and exile should be viewed as a period of embryonic development and gestation leading to the rebirth of our nation. The pain of childbirth is indeed excruciating, yet the mother accepts it because it heralds the exhilarating joy of welcoming a child into the world. Similarly, Israel's suffering is the ordeal that precedes the glorious rebirth of our people.

In a previous article, I mentioned a phenomenon of the Jewish calendar: the first night of Passover always falls on the same day of the week as the night of the following Tisha B'Av. The Rabbis trace the custom of dipping an egg in salt water on the night of the seder to this calendrical phenomenon. We dip an egg at the seder to commemorate Tisha B'Av and the destruction of the Temple. An egg is a sign of mourning, but it is also a symbol of fertility and represents the cycle of life.

The three weeks leading up to Tisha B'Av are called Bein Hametzarim, "between the straits" and between the days of distress. *Min Hametzar*, the verse from Psalms that we sing as part of *Hallel* on festivals and before the sounding of the shofar on Rosh Hashanah reminds us that while we are still caught in a state of narrowness and distress, we may find our freedom: "From the narrow place I called out to God; I was answered with divine expansiveness" (*Psalms* 118:5).


Freedom is expressed through song. Moreover, the end of the struggles of this world will be brought about by singing: "Israel will arise from exile with a song" (*Tikkunei Zohar*, 3*a*). On the continuum between narrowness and expanse, between exile and freedom, like the childbearing mother who cries out in Eli Tziyon, Israel's indescribable suffering is a travail to endure but the result of which ultimately leads to the glorious rebirth of our people.

May this hopeful message guide us through any personal or national suffering we may be experiencing in our days.

Inspiration in the Divine

I am writing this article exactly two weeks to the day after my father died.

I am not the same as I was: I am changed. The world does not feel the same as it did when I left for London on May 1 for the final trip while my dad was alive. I am unsure from moment to moment exactly what is unfolding as the landscape is so very new.

As I write this, we are approaching Shavuot and it feels like this is a new book of Torah that I haven't yet read. So it begins, learning the path of grief and life without my dad physically in it.

Some days I am tender and curious, and some days I am dry and fatigued to the bone. There are tears and also numbness. There is a desire to share and then, a strong need to be silent. There is a longing for hugs and then, a request not to be touched. There doesn't seem to be a map for this journey, so I do my best to trust it is all part of the process.

I do my best, day by day, moment by moment, breath by breath, Kaddish by Kaddish. And that brings me to you.

Thank you for the kindnesses, the deep hesed you have shown me and my family over this time. This includes my family meeting with Rav Baruch in the midst of the process, as well as an exquisite ritual he led for me when I got up from shiva. This includes my colleagues on the Spiritual Leadership Team and throughout the staff, checking in regularly from within their own crises, from Israel and from the midst of such a busy shul life. It includes Rabbi Steve Wernick representing all of you at the funeral, driving in and driving back immediately following. AND this includes cards, donations, flowers, hugs and shared resonance with congregants, familiar and now new friends and fellow travellers.

I am part of a club that no one wants to join but everybody does at some point. I am appreciating the contact with fellow *aveilim*, mourners, members of the same club as we recite Kaddish together.

Even from the midst of a time that feels quite creatively dry to me, I know that there will be a renewal of creative energy which I so look forward to sharing with you.

In this spirit, I am sharing with you one of the many creative adventures that I had the pleasure of leading this past year. These pictures are just a short snapshot from the second round of *Bree-AH*: *The Arts and Pray/Play Lab* that we ran Sunday mornings in March.

Was Meir Kahane an Anomoly? Six Phases of Jewish Militancy in the Land of Israel *with Dr. Shaul Magid*






The purpose of Small Groups is to learn, laugh and develop meaningful, caring relationships that deepen connections to other members, to Judaism and to Beth Tzedec while engaging in activities that are important to YOU. Through participating in BT Small Groups, congregants have expressed feeling a greater sense of community and camaraderie when in the synagogue, and decreased feelings and experiences of isolation. This year, we had 14 Small Groups on a wide range of topics including two social action book clubs, Zentagle meditative drawing, career advancement and memoir writing, to name just a few. In celebration of Israel's 75th birthday, we had a group on Zionist Ideas with another on Discovering our History Through Objects. All were led by dedicated Beth Tzedec members.

We are excited to expand our offerings for 2023-2024, and we are looking for new group leaders.

Do you have a passion, interest or hobby that you can share with others? Do you enjoy facilitating groups in discussion of a shared purpose? Experience is not necessary; BT Leadership will provide you the training and tools you need for success.

Impact of Being a Group Leader As a group leader, you will help members learn new skills or knowledge, help build caring relationships between group members and increase the sense of connection. Judy Berman, who co-led *The Good Life Conversations* with Judy Moncik said, "Being involved in a Small Group has enabled me to experience Beth Tzedec on a more intimate level, creating a sense of community among members who share my interests."



Responsibilities of a Group Leader

You would identify an activity that can be done over eight to ten sessions; lead/host the group in-person or through Zoom; facilitate discussion and create a sense of connection among seven to 15 group members.

What Makes a Great Group Leader?

Are you empathic with high IQ? Leaders should have an area of interest or expertise they are willing to explore, basic facilitation skills and some understanding of group dynamics or a willingness to learn. You should be comfortable with online technology.

Training and Support

You will not be alone! Group Leaders will take part in a minimum of two initial training sessions and additional training will be provided. Each Group Leader will be assigned a coach to assist with facilitation and problem solving. You will also be connected to other leaders and coaches.

Commitment

The commitment is from September to late June. Groups take place monthly or bi-monthly with each session being one to two hours. There will be some preparation time between sessions including scheduling meetings.

Format and Location

Groups can take place in person, online, a hybrid or a combination based on the needs of the group members. Groups can take place at the Synagogue, in members' homes or in other place appropriate to the activity. 

Volunteering: A Tradition

Three years ago, when the pandemic was rearranging our lives, I was asked to create a weekly Zoom get-together for seniors at Beth Tzedec who might be feeling isolated and lonely. On a whim, I chose a theme based on some delightful Yiddish cooking videos that I found on the Forward website, and so I named the group "Ess Gezunterheit (Eat in Good Health").

Three years later: the E.G.H. group is still "Zooming" together Thursday afternoons. The gang is now a dozen regular participants, with some dropins. One fellow even Zooms in from California!

Each week, we marvel at how we've all become real friends. We share each other's week, our stories, our *naches* and our challenges. We trade Pesaḥ recipes. We watch a bit of ballet video at the end. We are delighted to see each other in real life, when we come to shul. And it's been a life-enhancing surprise for me, the once-reluctant volunteer host. On May 27, Shabbat Shavuot, we honoured some special Beth Tzedec volunteers at our second annual *Yasher Koaḥ* Awards event in the Orenstein Mezzanine Hall with a short, joyful program (with ice cream). We hope many of you were able to join us!

Volunteer engagement at Beth Tzedec is growing, and there are going to be wonderful opportunities for more participation. Volunteering is a great way for you to be involved, at whatever time commitment works for you. There are many projects, both short- and long-term, that can use your skills and energy. You'll get to know others, make new friends and deepen your connections with our shul community.

Research on volunteering consistently shows that volunteers benefit in many ways. Volunteers report feeling happier, with more robust social connections. And it's known that volunteering has a positive effect on both physical and mental health.

REDI, in Action

Our communications team spoke with two of our anti-Racism, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Committee (REDI) members to bring you inside the conversation happening at Beth Tzedec, as we continue to make our synagogue more a more inclusive and welcoming place for all.

Leah Mauer and Jennifer Lau have been key volunteers in the establishment of the REDI Committee.

Read through to learn about the important work of this Committee, their goals and some opportunities for you to become involved.

Why is now the time to launch REDI?

The REDI (anti-Racism, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion) Committee actually launched several years ago in the wake of George Floyd's murder. At the time, like many communities, the Jewish community began to reckon with how we treat Jews of Colour and non-Ashkenazi Jews in our North American Jewish communities. It was important for Beth Tzedec to be part of this conversation in the moment.

Recognizing that Beth Tzedec is comprised of Jews from many different backgrounds, from the early days of the Committee's work, we pledged to not just be a group that checks the EDI box, but to be committed to doing this work and making Beth Tzedec a more equitable and inclusive place. We hope that because of our size and stature in the larger Jewish community in Toronto, Canada and North America that we can inspire others to do this work alongside us.

How do you see Beth Tzedec's role in representing that diversity to the Jewish community?

Beth Tzedec, as a congregation in midtown Toronto, caters to one of the most diverse groups in Canada. Forward thinking initiatives, like our Generations Membership, have attracted many members, especially younger members, of our diverse Jewish community to us in the last year. We now have a responsibility to show that we are an accepting, welcoming place that can be a Jewish home to Conservative Jews from all walks of life.

We hope that by making systemic changes to become a more inclusive *kehillah* for everyone that we can inspire other congregations to do the same for their members.

What Makes a Great Group Leader?

Are you empathic with high EQ? Leaders should have an area of interest or expertise they are willing to explore, basic facilitation skills and some understanding of group dynamics or a willingness to learn. You should be comfortable with on-line technology.

What onsite resources do you offer to facilitate discussions on race and equity?

Each of our meetings opens with a learning opportunity. Sometimes we circulate an article or short video for discussion before our meeting with some guiding discussion questions that will serve as a learning opportunity on race and equity. Other times, we engage speakers to lead a discussion with our Committee.

We are working on ways to bring this learning from our Committee to the wider congregation, whether that be in programming that we open to our membership, education and training sessions we run with our staff, spiritual leadership and lay leadership, or the work that we have our committee members do as they sit on other shul committees.

What success stories can you share that promote diversity and inclusion through REDI?

We are very happy that we now have an all gender washroom, located across from the nursery classrooms in the school wing!

What drew you to become a member of Beth Tzedec?

Leah: I became a member because my husband, Josh, has been a member of Beth Tzedec for most of his life. When we got married, he felt strongly that we should join. I was hesitant—not being from Toronto and not growing up in the Conservative movement, Beth Tzedec's size and stature were intimidating for me. However, quickly after becoming a regular attendee and involving myself in the shul it felt like home.

Jennifer: I am a Jew by Choice and a

Jew of Colour. I converted to Judaism while my husband and I were living in Brazil several years ago. When we moved back to Toronto, we wanted to find a synagogue that was warm and welcoming, committed to equality, had a diverse congregation and was wellsupported for programming and community engagement.

What plans do you have for the future of your Committee's work in this area, and how can members of the Congregation get involved and support your efforts?

We are working to enlist the work of an equity consultant who will examine all aspects of our organization from a REDI perspective and provide recommendations on what we can do to better engage all of our members. We also are working on a Hot Topics! session over the High Holy Days, and some projects around the connections between the Jewish and Indigenous communities in Toronto.

What positive engagement have you seen in the kehillah as a result of the REDI committee?

REDI seems to be top of mind for many of our staff and lay leadership in a way that it wasn't before our work began. Many of our spiritual leadership, staff and lay leaders have been involved in the Committee over the years, and we have noticed how their participation in our learning sessions has made them more aware of REDI in their daily practice.

Allan Soberman: Still Searching for His Voice

Think Soberman and you think music. The surname is recognizable to thousands of people, many of whom were students of the late Cantor Morris Soberrman^{z"}.

Cantor Soberman played a pivotal role in the lives of many Beth Tzedec members, and well beyond the membership. For over 35 years, he was the Cantor Sheini at Beth Tzedec, and during his tenure, he taught over 2,800 b'nei mitzvah students. Let that number sink in for a moment. The result of his lifetime of teaching is that, even in 2023, there are people in every part of the world who chant the Haftarah just as he taught and who hum melodies that he introduced. That is an impressive legacy!

The legacy goes even further with his son Allan.

of Cantor Morris and Tillie Soberman.

Allan, 73, is paying tribute to this legend of the Toronto liturgical musical world with his show, Searching for My Voice. And that title reflects, in large part, the story of growing up as the son



It is a challenge to grow up as a KC-kid of the clergy. Whether you like it or not, you and your siblings are watched, inspected, discussed and dissected in ways that your peers can never imagine. Allan was no exception. He and his sister, the late Susan Soberman z", often felt like they were under a microscope. Think of the 1946 movie The Jolson Story, the fictionalized story of the life of Al Jolson, and you get a glimpse into Allan and Susan's childhood years.

Allan did perceive his identity as "the Cantor's son". What helped him come to accept this role was his life with music. Growing up in a fourplex on Vaughan Road and later in a home in Cedarvale, Allan was a product of the 1960s and the music that was so prominent in that era—pop and folk music and the Beatles. This was, of course, in addition to his involvement in the Junior Choir and reading a bit of Torah. The result was a mixture of different melodic styles swirling in his head.

Allan dived headfirst into the music of his era when his father bought him his first guitar. In his teens, he picked up the bass and later performed with wedding bands and many local folk groups in Toronto. As an olive-branch gesture to his family, Allan graduated with a Commerce and Finance degree from the University of Toronto.

After graduation, he joined the early 1970s throngs of confused youth who did not see a clear life direction. He ended up in Israel for eight months on a kibbutz. When he returned to Canada, he tried to build a musical life. He married and had two children-and now four grandchildren. Always constant in his life was his music.

Allan appeared onstage opening for Billy Joel, among others. He worked with Juno award-winning performers like Bob Schneider, recording on Schneider's records and performing on his TV specials. Allan also co-wrote songs with a multitude of Nashville's top country songwriters throughout the '80s, gaining exposure to the larger musical stage.

Something major changed in 1999. After the death of his father, Allan was motivated to record *Searching For My Voice*, the first of two Hebrew albums of liturgical melodies from his synagogue youth, merged with the more contemporary sounds of his formative years. Allan liked to characterize the musical results as "The Beach Boys and Queen have a bar mitzvah".

With this project, Allan built a bridge between the liturgal and popular music styles, bringing him closer to his father.

When Searching For My Voice was released in 2002, it met with much acclaim. Praise was widespread throughout the Jewish world.

Allan's latest project is a theatrical version of *Searching For My Voice*, premiering this June at the Prosserman JCC. Presented as a solo theatre piece, "Searching For My Voice" will intertwine the original songs from the album along with archival projections to tell his personal life story. Beth Tzedec has reserved a block of tickets for the open night performance—Thursday, June 15 which can be accessed online **here** or in person at the Prosserman JCC, 4588 Bathurst St, North York.
